







BOND MEASURES CONTINUE TO PROVIDE NEW FACILITIES

Through the support of our communities, the District has passed two general obligation capital improvement bond measures. The first was Measure B, a \$498-million-dollar measure passed in March 2004, and the second is Measure A, a \$950-million-dollar measure passed in June 2016. Both bond measures addressed needed facility improvements at the two colleges.

Measure B began the process of upgrades and necessary repairs, while Measure A will enable us to continue preparing students for good paying jobs and transfer to four-year universities with state-of-the-art facilities and technology.

Measure B is now in its final phase of funding and construction. The new biology building at Chabot College is the final major project under the Measure B program and is currently under construction to provide five new laboratories to support science education.

Through Measure A, we continue to upgrade technology and bringing connectivity to every corner of the colleges. Each college will begin construction of student support space and expansion of learning resource facilities to align with the District's "Vision for Success". These projects at Chabot College include the Library and Learning Connection Facility, completion of the Biological Sciences Complex along with improvements to the Athletic Facilities. Las Positas College has begun the design work on the Academic Support Facility, Agricultural Sciences and the Public Safety, Advanced Manufacturing and Transportation Complex. Each of these programs are focused on developing sustainable facilities to meet the individual needs of our students and community.

The District expresses sincere appreciation to our service area residents for their continued support. CLPCCD also thanks the Measures A/B Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee, which monitors district Measures A/B expenditures.

CHILD WELFARE TRAINING PROGRAM

The Child Welfare Training Program completed its twelfth year providing training and professional development to people who care for out-of-home children and youth, including foster families, adoptive parents, county social workers, non-profit agency staff, family court attorneys, and other adults.

These adults completed training in an array of topics including child development, cultural humility, supporting pro-social behaviors, the impact of trauma on brain development, and hundreds more critical topics for ensuring foster, adoptive and probation involved kids receive competent care and services.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT & CONTRACT TRAINING

During 2018-19, the Economic Development and Contract Training department partnered with eighteen non-profit agencies and several national experts to provide 22,822 hours of training and training development for 91,389 attendees. The impact of these hours is much larger because each participant often works with 10-25 children and their families. Therefore, a significant portion of the over 4,000 infants, children and youth involved in the child welfare or probation systems across Alameda, Contra Costa, Lake, Mendocino and Solano Counties are impacted through these services.

OSHA TRAINING INSTITUTE EDUCATION CENTER

The OSHA Training Institute Education Center is authorized by the U.S. Department of Labor to deliver occupational health and safety training on behalf of OSHA.



Headquartered in Dublin, California since 2008, we currently deliver open-enrollment classes at 12 different sites throughout California, Nevada and Hawaii, as well as contract courses at the client's facility.

This year we served 3,522 students and held a total of 268 safety classes. We participated in five community outreach events including the Pacific Coast Safety Fest, the #MySafeSummerJob campaign, which educates youth and their parents on the importance of workplace safety, and the Safe + Sound 2019 event, which recognizes the successes of workplace safety programs that are preventing injuries, improving sustainability and the bottom line.

TRI-VALLEY CAREER CENTER

The Tri-Valley Career Center (TVCC) focuses its efforts on building the local workforce and preparing job seekers to be competitive in the job market. Staff guide job seekers through today's complicated job search process and connect them to local employers. For employers, the TVCC staff plan recruitment events large and small, offer recruitment assistance, and host an online job board to post open positions and find local talent.

This past year, TVCC saw more than 1,300 people who attended more than 240 workshops, held two large job fairs and a host of smaller ones.

They are now working as business analysts, human resource managers, pharmacy technicians, software engineers, truck drivers, and medical assistants, to name just a few. The strong economy has not slowed down the work of the Tri-Valley Career Center.

An added service at the Career Center is its Volunteer Income Tax Assistance during tax season. Staff and over 30 volunteers prepared over 550 tax returns for low-income residents of the Tri-Valley and beyond. The average household income this past season for the families helped was \$28,152. For the past six years we have offered this service in Dublin, at the Pleasanton Library and at Las Positas College.

Our annual community outreach event, Pacific Coast Safety Fest served 373 students with low/no cost worker safety training in collaboration with Cal/OSHA and federal OSHA from March 5-9, 2018. In addition, we participated in 17 other community and industry events in support of workplace safety in our region.















MESSAGE FROM CHABOT COLLEGE PRESIDENT


Chabot College continues to innovate in its programs and services to its richly diverse communities offering superb educational opportunities for students, many of whom are the first in their





CHABOT COLLEGE HIGHLIGHTS OF 2018-19

CHABOT CELEBRATED ITS LARGEST GRADUATING CLASS

Chabot College awarded over 1,275 Associate degrees to the Class of 2019, making it the largest class to graduate in college history. Chabot College also awarded the largest number of Certificates in its history with over 800 Certificates earned. A 47% increase over the Class of 2018.

DREAM CENTER OPENS

Chabot College celebrated the grand opening of the new Dream Center on January 31, 2019. Chabot was awarded a California Campus Catalyst Fund grant for \$125,000 in support of undocumented student services and training. The Center organized several comprehensive activities, which included the establishment of a Dream Center office in El Centro, college-wide UndocuAlly Training, a Laptop Loan program for undocumented students, legal aid workshops, refining college web information and collateral resources, and augmenting mental health counseling training and resources.

The California Campus Catalyst Fund is a three-year initiative founded by educators, funders, and advocates to increase support at campuses representing the state's three public higher-education components: California Community Colleges, California State University, and the Universities of California.

RISE PROGRAM MAKES A DIFFERENCE

The Restorative Integration Self-Education (RISE) learning community is an implementation of a three-way partnership, jail-to-college pathway at Chabot College to address the significant needs of formerly incarcerated and justice-impacted students.

The program enrolls and supports low-risk inmates who are released on probation to gain the skills to re-enter society and their community through education and vocational training. Last year, RISE celebrated ten graduates from Chabot with Associate in Arts degrees and Certificates leading to gainful employment. Through the joint efforts of Dr. Sperling, Academic Services, Open Gate, the RISE staff, and the Chabot community, the RISE program is thriving into the 2019-20 academic year.

THE FRIENDS OF CHABOT COLLEGE FOUNDATION HOLD THEIR FIFTH ANNUAL GALA

The Friends of Chabot College foundation held their fifth annual Gala at TPC Stonebrae Country Club in the Hayward Hills. We honored leaders who made sustaining contributions to Chabot College and a distinguished alumnus:

Former Senator Ellen Corbett, Chabot College Professor, Alumna, and former California State Senator. She currently serves on the Board of the East Bay Regional Parks.

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CONGRATULATIONS SCHOLARS!

In Spring, Chabot recognized the 2019 scholarship award winners. The Friends of Chabot College Foundation (FCC) collaborated with the Chabot College Office of Student Life (OSL) and Student Senate on the annual Scholarship Luncheon where we awarded \$99,500 in scholarships this year! We received a record setting 490+ unique applicants and over 1,100 applications. A special thank you to the 60 Chabot scholarship reviewers and everyone who made the 2019 Scholarship Luncheon a great success.

ALUMNI & FRIENDS ASSOCIATION - AN EXCUSE TO EAT PIE! SOCIAL

The Alumni & Friends Association celebrated Chabot 360 Alumni (Chabot employees who were also students) by hosting "An Excuse to Eat Pie! Social." Alumni reconnected with other 360 colleagues, reminisced about their student years at Chabot, and ate an assortment of complimentary pies! Activities included a welcoming icebreaker, Chabot Trivia, and a Pie in the Face game.

CHABOT COLLEGE ATHLETICS

REESE PROCTOR: TRACK & FIELD

Freshman Track sensation, Reese Proctor, had a standout year for the Chabot College Gladiators.

Proctor won the Coast Conference, Northern
California and State Championships in the 800-meter sprint in 2019. On his way to a State Championship,
Proctor secured himself the top spot in the Chabot
Track & Field record book by running a 1:49.92 sprint,
replacing a record set in 1979. Proctor ended his season with an invitation to the United States Track
& Field Under 20 National Championships. Proctor has accepted a scholarship to attend the University of Indiana. Proctor was coached by Head Coach
Kyle Robinson.

ANTHONY CRESS: WRESTLING

United State Marine Corp veteran and sophomore wrestler, Anthony Cress, won back to back California Community College Athletic Association State Championships in 2017 and 2018. Cress becomes only the third athlete in Chabot College Wrestling history to win two state championships. Cress is a graduate of Antioch High School and is married with a newborn baby. Cress was also the recipient of the inaugural Iron Gladiator Award in 2019 and was selected as the Male Athlete of the Year in 2018. Cress was coached by Head Coach Steve Siroy.

CHABOT FOOTBALL

Chabot Football finished the 2018 campaign with a 5-5 record, but the real winners were the nineteen student athletes who will continue their education and football playing careers at four-year colleges. These young men have received scholarships to play football at colleges and universities across the country. These football players were coached by Head Coach Eric Fanene and his staff. 





LAS POSITAS COLLEGE HIGHLIGHTS OF 2018-19

FIRE SERVICE TECHNOLOGY

Las Positas College (LPC) received approval to be the first Fire Safety Training (FST) program recognized by the Fire and Emergency Services Higher Education (FESHE) initiative in the State. Established by the United States Fire Administration, FESHE is run by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). FESHE has reviewed the Las Positas College curriculum and student outcomes in order to verify that they meet national standards. The program was then reviewed by the National Fire Training Academy to confirm that LPC FST courses met the standards. The FST courses received approval by both FESHE and National Fire Training, which allows LPC students to transfer to any FESHE-recognized four-year institution to obtain a bachelor degree in Fire Management.

WORK-BASED LEARNING PROGRAM, INTERNSHIPS, JOB FAIRS, AND MAJOR FAIRS

The Las Positas College Work-Based Learning Program continued to help build a strong workforce for our region – a win-win for LPC students and area employers. Many students obtained jobs and internships with area businesses and organizations, including Lawrence Livermore and Sandia National Laboratories, city offices, and the office of Congressman Eric Swalwell. Kaiser Permanente hired LPC students for information technology internships and apprenticeships at the technology campus, allowing students to work and continue taking classes at LPC while earning competitive salaries, tuition reimbursement, and health benefits.

Las Positas College held two fairs for Public Safety majors in the Fall and Spring. Over twenty-one (21) Police, Fire, Emergency Medical Services (EMS), and other Public Safety-related employers participated, resulting in our students having meaningful interactions and potential career contacts. Public Safety-related employers included San Francisco Fire Department, Alameda County Probation, Hayward Area Recreation and Park District, and Falck Ambulance of Northern California. Last year, LPC also held five Job and Internship Fairs.









VITICULTURE & WINE TECHNOLOGY

The Viticulture & Enology program has established a new foundation operating as Campus Hill Winery. It has obtained a license, which allows wine developed by LPC students to be made and sold to the general public onsite, and in local restaurants and wine stores.

Nestled in the heart of the Tri-Valley's rich wineries, LPC's Viticulture and Winery Technology programs prepare students for transfer to four-year colleges and universities and towards careers in the wine industry through its degree and certificate pathways.

The program, which has been offered since 2004, originally provided students real world experience at local wineries, but the hands-on portion was brought onsite when LPC added its own vineyard in 2007.

"Having the students gain experience selling wine face-to-face with retailers is a great learning opportunity."

"This is a tremendous opportunity for the college to continue to build upon the heritage of Tri-Valley's wine country," said Nan Ho, LPC's Dean of Academic Service for Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics. "At Las Positas, students learn the entire process from growing the fruit and taking care of the vineyard, to harvest, crush, fermentation, bottling, and labeling. And now, our community can purchase the wine the students have made."

Campus Hill Winery's red wine, South Slope Field Blend 2017, won gold and Best of Show/Double Gold in the amateur category at the 2019 Alameda County Fair wine competition. The new licensure will allow the winery to join with commercial cellars in future competitions.

"This is an exciting milestone," said LPC's Viticulture and Winery Technology Faculty and Program Coordinator David Everett. "This will give students experience in a producing winery. Adhering to compliance is key. Following strict protocols and practices is important to an operating winery."

2018-2019 SCHOLARSHIP AWARD CEREMONY

Las Positas College held its 42nd Annual Student Scholarship Awards ceremony honoring dozens of students for their hard work, dedication, and commitment. Among the awards presented were Mertes scholarships composed of four award categories. The first was given to two basketball players, one male and one female, who each received a \$5,000 scholarship. The second category was for transfer scholarships up to \$30,000 per student who had completed two years at LPC and was planning to transfer to complete a four-year degree. The next category was for performing arts transfer scholarships up to \$30,000 per student per year. Lastly, there were awards of up to \$10,000 per year to students at LPC or Chabot who were in the process of obtaining a degree in the allied health fields.

VETERANS PROGRAM RECEIVES \$200K IN NEW FUNDING

The California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office recently allocated \$8.5 million to 59 community colleges with veteran's resource centers. LPC was granted \$200,000 of those funds to support veterans as they transition to civilian life. It will help to develop, expand, or increase programs and services available to veteran

students, and increase awareness, access, and usage of student support services for veterans. The new funding will allow LPC's Veterans First Program to enhance the Operation Gateway (OPG) program, an intensive, two-day new student orientation for veterans. It will also provide additional academic support services for students completing gateway courses, and improve case management to promote student success.

VETERANS FIRST PROGRAM RECEIVED \$35,000 SAFEWAY FOUNDATION GRANT

The Las Positas College Veterans First Program received a grant from the Safeway Foundation in the amount of \$35,000 to provide support services to those LPC students who have served in the armed forces, are currently serving, or are dependents and spouses of veterans.

The LPC Veterans First Program (VFP) is primarily responsible for the administration of veterans' educational benefits programs. VFP also provides veterans and their dependents other resources and contacts, such as career planning, financial aid, transition counseling services, and other needed services to help them pursue and achieve their educational goals.

MEN'S AND WOMEN'S SWIM & DIVE TEAMS


5th Consecutive Coast Conference Championship
